ROME HOTEL DE LA VILLE

Everywhere you look in the Hotel de la Ville, you'll be confronted with spectacular colours, patterns and objects – it's a real feast for the eyes, much as Rome must have been for 18th-century noblemen undertaking the Grand Tour of Europe's artistic landmarks. This long-lost cultural tradition inspired decorator Tommaso Ziffer, working with hotel design director Olga Polizzi, to fill the 18th-century palazzo with Italian antiques, classical art and stimulating hues, so that it holds its own amid grand surroundings – the Spanish Steps, Trevi Fountain and Pantheon are nearby. "It's historic but modern, more maximalist than minimalist," reflects Ziffer.

Opened just last year, the hotel wears its elegance lightly, with a palette of fresh green, yellow and rust shades in guest rooms and a contemporary approach to art: details from neoclassical paintings are blown up and hung frameless, over vibrant patterned wall-papers and constellations of vintage mirrors. Many rooms come with their own terrace and fabulous views, but don't neglect the social spaces – cocktails at the Julep Herbal & Vermouth Bar and al fresco dining at Mosaico, an apricot-painted courtyard garden, are unmissable.
